

Successful CIP Applicants from the 2013/14 funding round

Te Taiwhenua o Heretaunga Trust

\$47,287

Te Taiwhenua o Heretaunga Trust (TTOH) has been a charitable trust since 1988 and is both an Iwi authority and provider of health, hinengaro (mind) education and training and social services. Based at the Heretaunga Park and Community Conference Centre in Hastings, they employ approximately 180 staff working in the wider Hawke's Bay region including Wairoa and Central Hawke's Bay. Some services are also provided in Tararua and Wairarapa. Their intern is the current Hawke's Bay District Council (HBDHD) Māori Health Services Manager. They will work to strengthen the relationship between the HBDHB and TTOH which is the largest Māori health provider in the region.

Otago Youth Wellness Trust

\$36,834

Otago Youth Wellness Trust (OYWT) is a free community based service for young people ages 11-18 years' old who have multiple and complex needs, and who are least likely to access mainstream services for support. Their grant is to fund an intern from The Salvation Army. OYWT state that the Otago community reports relatively high rates of young people not engaged in education, employment or training. They would like to play a lead role in reversing this through increased collaboration with experienced partners such as the Salvation Army.

Coromandel Independent Living Trust

\$35,778

The Coromandel Independent Living Trust (CILT), based in Coromandel township was registered in 2005. The Group provides advice, support, needs assessment,

and service co-ordination to people, including those with disabilities and special needs, throughout the Coromandel Peninsula. The internship will enable CILT to map out an organisational strategic plan for the next ten years to address barriers such as the isolation of their current location and how this affects their ability to attract qualified, skilled workers.

The SILC Charitable Trust

\$35,013

The SILC Charitable Trust in Tauranga was established in 2004, as a sustainable entity to support the service delivery arms of its organisations, to provide quality support for people with mental and physical disabilities. The Trust aims to support inclusive communities where everyone belongs, recognising the uniqueness of each individual, whilst supporting their strengths, needs and aspirations. Spectrum care are providing The SILC Charitable Trust with an intern to review, analyse and plan the group's information technology systems to meet the increasing needs of their customer base.

The Hikurangi Foundation

\$33,000

The Hikurangi Foundation is a business incubator for social enterprises. Funded initially by Todd and Tindall Foundations for three years (\$1.5 million), the group are currently working with 15 "ventures" and provide hands on management, guidance and support for start up social enterprises. All of the current ventures Hikurangi are supporting meet a community need, including transport, housing and energy. An intern provided by the law firm Russell McVeagh will work with a number of the 15 ventures to ensure the right structures, including governance are put in place for those social enterprises to succeed, provide community benefit, and return profits back into the community under sound legal principal.

Saint Martin Island Community Incorporated

\$26,425

The largest island in the Otago Harbour spanning over 35 acres – was where many of the early settler ships to Otago in the late 1800s sent people who were sick or had infectious disease. In the late 1950s, members of the Knox Church and the Theological Hall applied for and obtained a lease for the Island and began the process of environmental and ecological regeneration. Known as Saint Martin Island Community Inc, their name was derived from the Island's name which is believed to have originated from a European man known for his commitment to people with intellectual disabilities, and to community and social justice. The group believes that their strong historical church affiliation may be creating a barrier to people participating and contributing to the Island's programmes. Their intern from the Salvation Army will focus on capacity and capability building, with a primary goal of developing new programmes, material/resources and communication strategies that extend their outreach to people and communities in Dunedin and the wider Otago region.

Wellington Sexual Abuse Help Foundation

\$15,460

Wellington Sexual Abuse HELP Foundation (Wellington Help) was established in 1985 to provide support and counselling services for survivors of rape, sexual assault, and child abuse. The organisation works in liaison with the Police and health professionals, and is a member of the Sexual Abuse Prevention Network, which is a collaboration with Hutt Rape Crisis and WellStop. Increasing demand for Wellington Help's services has seen the majority of their funding go into front line service delivery, leaving little for back office support. The intern provided by Compass Health will develop reception services, improve their client appointment management systems and develop monitoring systems to track outcomes. The internship will enable Wellington Help to provide a more streamlined service for their clients.
